

How to Find Funding

For parks and green space community groups

Introduction

Many community groups affiliated with parks and other green spaces are keen to raise funds so they can achieve their aims. Funds are required for many reasons - they might be needed for site improvements (e.g. trees, paths, signage or wildflower meadows), or to run events or for insurance or tools for volunteers. Whatever the reason you need funding, this document aims to give you some ideas about where to look.

Before you get started

A group that plans to fundraise for a project needs to be organised. We would recommend that you only start seeking funding after you have set up a committee for your group including a Chair, Treasurer and Secretary, agreed a constitution and opened a bank account. Having these things in place makes it a lot more likely you will succeed in gaining funding and achieving your objectives.

Planning

Before starting to look for funding, you need to be clear what you are trying to achieve. Your group should have an action plan with objectives in priority order.

Always ensure your plans have been approved by the landowner before agreeing them – otherwise, you might find you spend considerable time and effort on a project you don't get permission for in the end.

Think about different ways you can achieve your objectives; you might not always need to raise money - are there alternative solutions such as using volunteers to do labour or getting in-kind donations (like tools or materials) from local businesses?

Do your research – are there any other organisations with similar aims? There's no point duplicating what another organisation is already doing (and you might end up competing for funding) but it might be worth working in partnership if another organisation does share your aims - you can often achieve more together.

Once you have identified your objectives, break them down into the component parts and what they will cost (remember to consider if they can be achieved by other means e.g. in-kind?). It's important to know how much you need to raise and if the funding you require is capital or revenue, one-off or ongoing.

You are now ready to identify some potential funding sources.

Types of funding

There are two main ways to obtain funding:

1. 'Do it yourself' fundraising which involves encouraging people to donate to your cause in various ways ranging from selling raffle tickets to seeking sponsorship.
2. Applying for grants – a more formal approach whereby you apply to funders for grants to pay for all or part of your project.

More details about these methods are provided below.

1. Do it yourself fundraising

This method of fundraising, which involves getting people to donate to your project, can work well.

Options:

- a) Get people to donate directly to your cause through crowd funding. Internet websites like '*Just Giving*' (www.justgiving.com) or '*Local Giving*' (www.localgiving.org) are perfect for this or you can use collection buckets to take cash donations.
- b) Membership subscriptions are also a way you could raise funds – ask people to pay a small amount to join your organisation or for an annual fee.
- c) Run fundraising events. There could include anything from a family fun days to jumble sale, sponsored walks to raffles.
- d) Make contact with local businesses who may be interested in supporting your project by donating money or in kind support. Some businesses might be interested in sponsoring your project (make sure you speak to the landowner before agreeing any sponsorship package).

This kind of fundraising will require lots of publicity to ensure people are aware of your cause. Think about using social media, posters, flyers, press releases, etc. to promote your project.

2. Grants

Grant funding is available from various organisations including national and local government, charitable trusts and foundations, the lottery and landfill tax.

In particular, it is worth approaching local councillors as they can often provide useful advice on funding that is available in the area.

See the table at the end of this document for a list of open grant schemes that might be suitable for your project.

It is also worth doing an internet search of grants available from big businesses operating in your area e.g. supermarkets and banks.

Tips for applying for funding

- Before you do anything else, check that your organisation and your project are eligible for the grant.

- Read the guidelines carefully before filling in the form – make sure your application explains how your project will achieve the aims of the funders.
- It's often worth giving the funders a call before applying to discuss your project and how suitable it is for the grant – they may give you some tips on applying too.

Further information and support

Voluntary Action Leeds is the main organisation in the city devoted to supporting community and voluntary groups.
